Dear National Fire Academy Student:

Congratulations on being accepted into the U.S. Fire Administration's National Fire Academy's *Community Education Leadership (CEL)--One Week* course. *CEL--One Week* teaches students contemporary leadership elements necessary for successful comprehensive community education, including striving for personal commitment in community education and obtaining organizational and community support. The course teaches students to identify community issues and diverse target populations and how to select appropriate methods for reaching diverse groups. Students learn to address the most critical fire and life safety issues for a community and write measurable performance objectives.

We realize that each organization often has very different support systems and levels of sophistication in fire and life safety education. We ask you not to get "hung up" on trying to think that you and your organization will have everything that we ask you to bring to class. **It will be helpful if you can bring the following items to class.**

1. A mission statement from your organization and, if available, a description of the prevention/education function.
2. Bring with you a problem that you would like to address in your community to be used in class activities (i.e., falls to the elderly, kitchen burns to pre-school children). Although not essential, you are encouraged to bring data, goals/objectives and any other program information regarding this problem.
3. We often make time for students to share their programs with one another. You are encouraged to bring any educational program, media pieces, or even high-tech programs that your organization uses in the area of fire or life safety education.


It is important to note that this is a 6-day class, and the first day of class will begin on Sunday at approximately 8 a.m. just after orientation. Orientation will normally commence at 8 a.m.; however, make sure you confirm this when you check in. Subsequent classes will meet daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. with graduation occurring on Friday at 4 p.m. Because of this schedule, you will be provided lodging for Friday night. Evening classes may be required.

End-of-class graduation ceremonies are an important part of the course and you are expected to attend. Please do not make any travel arrangements to leave campus until after you and your classmates graduate.

Increasing numbers of students and instructors are bringing laptop computers to campus. You alone are responsible for the security and maintenance of your equipment. The Academy cannot provide you with computer software, hardware, or technical support to include disks, printers, scanners, etc. There is a limited number of 120 Volt AC outlets in the classrooms. A Student Computer Lab is located in Building D and is available for all students to use. It is open daily with technical support provided in the evenings. This lab uses Windows XP and Office 2003 as the software standard.
