TWO-DAY RESIDENT PROGRAM

What is it?

In addition to the 6- and 10-day resident campus educational opportunities, the National Fire Academy offers shorter, more intense courses on designated weekends for fire and rescue personnel from specific States. These 2-day programs provide a unique opportunity for the Academy to supplement training provided by the State training agencies or organizations. Because these courses are offered on weekends, students have additional opportunities to visit the campus and participate in Academy courses.

HOW DOES THE TWO-DAY RESIDENT PROGRAM WORK?

State Role/Responsibility:

The State fire training system requests and sponsors the weekend solely for participants from that State. The sponsoring State agency selects the courses to be conducted, recruits and selects the students according to prescribed student selection criteria, and arranges transportation to the NETC campus. Students are responsible for the cost of meals and incidentals. The State sponsor is responsible for coordinating administrative functions and logistical activities with the National Fire Academy staff.

Students representing the Federal government or private industry will be provided lodging at the prevailing rates.

The courses offered during a Two-Day Resident Program are the same 2-day courses offered in the field. The curriculum covers a variety of subjects, including tactical operations, incident command, firefighter health and safety, hazardous materials, leadership, emergency response to terrorism, arson, and public education, among others.

ABOUT THE NATIONAL FIRE ACADEMY

Campus and Facility:

Located on the campus of the National Emergency Training Center (NETC) in Emmitsburg, Maryland, the National Fire Academy (NFA) offers the finest in educational resources. The 107-acre campus, in the scenic foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains, is the headquarters of the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), which includes the NFA and the Emergency Management Institute (EMI). The campus is 3 miles south of the Pennsylvania border, 75 miles north of Washington, DC, and 50 miles northwest of Baltimore, Maryland.

The campus offers fully equipped, air-conditioned classrooms, five dormitories, which can accommodate 452 students, and spacious dining facilities. In addition, modern equipment for laboratory exercises is available. An arson fire-scene laboratory, a fire protection laboratory, and a fire tactics simulator are unique features of the campus educational environment.

The NETC campus also houses the Learning Resource Center (LRC), a library available for students attending the NFA. The LRC houses over 100,000 books, reports, magazines, and audiovisual materials, which help support and facilitate student and faculty research and curriculum development and design activities.
